The Times got a chance to have a little down time with the obviously happy and excited "Rising Star" and spoke to him a little about his journey to his fourth album.


THE JOURNEY

He then joined his parents in the United States and immediately joined a band called Anthem and stayed with them for four years, but then saw the need to form his own band called Reflex who played strictly reggae music.
