TIPS ON KEEPING THE HOME SAFE

It is important for consumers to know the necessities surrounding safety of their homes. Here, Mr. Campbell gives some tips on what to do and what to look for when looking to make your home safe.

- Most people would think of an attractive lock set. A good lock set does not necessarily mean an attractive lock
- 2. Never install a loose inner knob on glass doors. This can allow easy access to the inside. "The intruder can easily break the glass and easily open the lock," Mr. Campbell said. Always install double dead bolt locks with protective screws. The protected screws are for added security. Even if someone breaks the glass, they will not be able to enter
- 3. When building, try not to put a window next to any entrance door. This also allows for easy access
- 4. Grilling the house is not as safe as it is meant to be. This is because people always tend to leave keys lying in the wrong areas and they always install the wrong locks, e.g. padlocks that are easy to "pick" (or open without the proper key).
- 5. It is recommended to use a "one key" system for entrance/exit purposes to your house. "For example, if you install a dead bolt or knob lock to your main door with a one-key system, we supply the box for you to install a dead bolt to your grill system. With that, you get the same key to operating the main door and the dead bolt lock on the grill."

MISTAKES PEOPLE MAKE

According to Mr. Campbell, people don't always practice the best methods in safety.
"Some of the mistakes people will make include locking their keys in the car, going for a swim with the keys in their pockets and putting the keys under a stone, a mat or a flower pot in the yard. They will also leave a note saying that they will soon be back or tell where they are going and another big mistake is keeping all the keys of the same door/lock on one bunch," he said.

Nine out of ten household burglaries are preventable

Think about it, knowing about a burglar's three worst enemies - light, time and noise - can help you protect your home from crime. A burglar won't find your home an "easy mark" if he's forced to work in the light, if he has to take a lot of time breaking in, and if he can't work quietly.

"Case" Your Place

Take the time to "case" your house or apartment, just as a burglar would. Here are a few questions to get you started:

Where is the easiest entry? How can you make it more burglar resistant? Trim trees and shrubs near your doors and windows, and think carefully before installing a high, wooden fence around your back yard. High fences and shrubbery can add to your privacy, but privacy is a burglar's asset. Consider trading a little extra privacy for a bit of added security. Force any would-be burglar to confront a real enemy — light.

Exterior lights, mounted out of easy reach, can reduce the darkness a burglar finds

How can you slow burglars down? Time is a burglar's enemy, too. A burglar delayed for four or five minutes is apt to give up and try for another, less difficult location. Simple security devices — including such ordinary equipment as nails, screws, padlocks, door and window locks, grills, bars and bolts — can discourage intruders and keep them from entering.

keep them from entering.

How about noise? Try to make the general prospect of robbing your home a noisy job. Noise is that important third enemy of the burglar. Many types of alarm systems are available, with detectors to be mounted on doors and windows. Deciding just how much home protection you need — and can afford — is a personal judgment. Ask the police to have someone survey your home and advise you about suitable protection.

Are any of your valuables - such as a painting, a silver collection or an antique chaireasy to see from outside? Rearranging your furnishings might be advisable if it serves to make your home less inviting to criminals! Incidentally, should you ever need to report a burglary or file an insurance claim, a household inventory - a listing of your furniture and major personal belongings - could be a valuable document.

Consider Some Specifics

Reducing the risk of break-ins is simply a matter of making your home less inviting to burglars than other homes in the neighborhood. It's up to you.

Doors: Outside doors should be metal or solid hardwood, and at least 1 3/4 inches

thick. Frames must be made of equally strong material, and each door must fit its frame securely. Remember, if it is placed in a weak door, even the most efficient look will not keep out a determined burglar. A peephole or a wide-angle viewer in the door is safer for identifying visitors than a door chain. Sliding glass doors present a special problem because they are easy to open, but there are locks designed for them. A broomstick in the door channel can help, but don't depend on it for security.

Locks. Deadbolt locks are best.

Windows. Key locks are available for all types of windows. Double-hung windows can be secured simply by "pinning" the upper and lower frames together with a nail, which can be removed from the inside. For windows at street level, consider iron grates or

BEST LOCKS FOR DIFFERENT PLACES

The most selected brand, Mr. Campbell said, is Schlage. "It is very expensive, but it is very strong; it doesn't change or rust easily. You can have that up to 15 years." Kwik (Quick) Set is a cheaper brand, but it gives excellent security. For padlocks, he said that the Discus Locks are used for protecting high security storage areas. The American padlock is also for high security storage areas, but is more costly. "It is highly recommended," he said.

Businesses

For glass doors, a one inch and a half metal door locks with a double entry key way is recommended. Wooden doors should have double dead bolt locks with protective screws.

Homes

Wooden doors in homes should also have dead bolt locks with protective screws, along with key-in-the-knob systems for push/pull action. Glass doors are not recommended to be used as the main door or entrance. Use hard wood doors with added security chain and peep

Windows

Windows are normally bolted. "We have cylindrical lock systems to protect windows which are very attractive and give great security. Best recommended securities are bolts for economical restraints," Mr. Campbell said.

Make the Extra Effort

Here are some "home security habits" to develop and practice: Establish a routine to follow in making certain that doors and windows are locked and alarm systems are turned on

Avoid giving information to unidentified telephone callers, or announcing your

Avoid giving information to unidentified telephone callers, or announcing your personal plans in want ads or public notices (such as giving your address when advertising items for sale). Notify police if you see suspicious strangers in your area. Handle your keys carefully. Don't carry house keys on a key ring bearing your home address or leave house keys with your car in a commercial parking lot. Don't hide your keys in "secret" places outside your home - burglars usually know where to look. Remember special vacation tips. This is a clear giveaway that the owners are not home. When going on vacation, leave blinds in their usual position. Have mail and packages picked up, forwarded or held by the post office. Lower the sound of your telephone bell so it can't be heard outside. Arrange to have your lawn mowed or your walk-way kept clean. Stop newspaper deliveries. Ask a friend to pick up "throwaway" newspapers and circulars. Use automatic timers to turn lights on and off in your living room and bedrooms at appropriate times. Consider connecting a radio to a timer. Tell police and dependable neighbours when you plan to be away and join with your neighbours to keep a close watch on what's happening in your area - working closely with them is a good way to prevent crime. Talk to your neighbourhood watch.

And Remember This

Confronting a thief in your home is frightening. Follow this advice:

Run away if you can and call police.
 Lock yourself in a room if you can't escape.
 Cooperate and stay as

calm as possible should you find yourself face-toface with a burglar.

4. Report any losses to
